
BOO! It's Scary Time at the Strauss Mansion Museum

The 2I-room Victorian-era Strauss Mansion is a fascinating place to visit any time of the year, with its beautiful architecture, period displays and local historical artifacts. But each October, the Mansion takes on a different ambiance with its documented haunted history.



For the sixth consecutive year, the Atlantic Highlands Historical Society presented a showing of the first horror movie ever made, the silent film Nosferatu. To comply with COVID protocols, the film was again shown on a large screen in the Mansion's spacious rear yard with social distancing by the audience. Cody McCorry and his musicians again accompanied the silent film with McCorry's original musical composition to a sell-out crowd. At the first showing, the band and received a standing ovation,

The weather forecast for the second night was 100% rain, so the Society made the decision to move the presentation indoors at the Mansion. Ticket holders were informed via an eblast that was being done and that masking would be required. For anyone uncomfortable with the masking requirement, refunds would be made. It was anticipated there would be a number of cancellations. Surprisingly, EVERYONE CAME! In fact, it was necessary to open all the windows and seat some of the audience outside on the porch, looking in to view the film. Final count was 115 attendees over the two nights.

Next year is Nosferatu's 100th anniversary and a special event is being planned. Details will be posted on the Society's website, AHhistory.org, as they are developed. Do vampires celebrate birthdays??? Or is it their "making" days they remember???






Once again, six Ghost Tours were conducted at the 128-year-old haunted Strauss Mansion on Saturday, October 23rd and Sunday, October 24th. Due to COVID protocols, participation was limited.

While the spirits of the Strauss Mansion have their own agendas and do not always integrate with our ghost tours, the participants enjoyed the tour of the building, viewed paranormal frontages from earlier experiments captured in the building, and observed a Victorian Wine Glass Seance.





A last-minute addition to the Strauss Mansion's spooky October schedule was a showing of the classic horror film House on Haunted Hill at the Atlantic Moviehouse on First Avenue in Atlantic Highlands on October 29th. (The film was shown in the purportedly haunted screening room.)

House on Haunted Hill is a 1959 American supernatural horror film directed by William Castle and starring Vincent Price and Carol Ohmart. Price plays an eccentric millionaire who, along with his wife, has invited five people to the house for a "haunted house" party.

Whoever manages to satay in the house for the night will

earn \$10,000. As the night progresses, the guests are trapped within the house with an assortment of terrors.

In its original theatrical release, certain theaters were equipped with a promotional gimmick called "Emergo." Exhibitors rigged an elaborate pulley system near the theater screen which allowed a plastic skeleton to be flown over the audience during a corresponding scene late in the film, frightening the viewers. (Several modern repertory cinemas, including Loew's Jersey (Jersey City, New Jersey) Theatre, have hosted revival screenings of the film during which the "Emergo" gimmick has been recreated.)


Several dozen attendees, maintaining COVID protocols, screamed, cheered and laughed at the still-timely lines in the film.

Blast From the Past — Atlantic Highlands Style

The Holiday season is almost upon us. Since this will be our last newsletter until Spring, 2022, I thought I would talk about some of the recipes the Atlantic Highlands Journal printed over the years. These include interesting recipes with interesting ingredients.

Try a few at your holiday dinner party. Personally, I don't think I will be serving Timbale of Halibut (1894 recipe). Putting cooked halibut through a sieve does not sound very appetizing. And I'm not sure what a gill of milk is*. I would try Asparagus Casserole (1940 recipe) except I would use fresh asparagus.

The Thanksgiving Dinner

For those who wish to prepare a Thanksgiving dinner a trifle more elaborate than the old-fashioned turkey and vegetable with mince and pumpkin pie, the following menu is excellent:

Clear soup
Timbale of halibut
Shrimp sauce
Potato balls
Roasted turkey
Oyster sauce
Cranberry jelly
Stuffed peppers
Sweet potato
croquettes
Sausage balls
Lettuce salad
Wafers—Cheese
Charlotte russe
Coffee

To make the timbale of h halibut, a ½ lb of cooked halibut is put through a sieve. A gill

of milk is placed over the fire, into which is stirred a ½ pint of bread crumbs, it being removed as soon as it commences to boil and added to the fish, the whole being thoroughly mixed. To this is added in turn the well beaten whites of three eggs and a teaspoonful of salt, together with a touch of red pepper. It is then put into a fish mold, placed in a pan of hot water and

goes into the oven for 20 minutes. The sauce is made from a tablespoonful of butter, a tablespoonful of flour, a gill of milk and ½ pint of shrimp. The butter and flour are mixed for a moment over the fire, the milk and shrimp being stirred in after their removal from the stove.

*Ed. Note: An antiquated liquid measurement, in the United States a gill is equal to one-half cup/four fluid ounces, while in England a gill (known as an imperial gill) is equal to five fluid ounces.

Asparagus Casserole

3/3 Cup butter

1 teaspoon salt

1 No. 2 can green asparagus

3/4 cups liquid from can of
asparagus

4 hard cooked eggs

3/5 cup fine dry bread crumbs

3/6 cup flour
pepper

11/4 cups tomato juice

1 chopped pimiento

3/2 cup grated American cheese

Melt four tablespoons of the butter in a saucepan on surface of
range. Turn to low heat and add
flour, salt and pepper to make a
smooth paste. Drain liquid and add
tomato juice. Stir into flour and
cook on slow heat, stirring until
thick. Add pimiento. Put 3/2 of
asparagus, sliced eggs, sauce and
cheese in oiled casserole. Repeat
and top with bread crumbs. Melt
remaining butter and pour over
crumbs. Bake thirty-five minutes
in 425° F. oven.
